Hello everybody-I hope you are still enjoying the sunshine. We continue to look forward to hearing from you. Today, I have set another four tasks and another riddle!

Riddle: If two's company, and three's a crowd, what are four and five?

Now here are your 4 activities: **Only check the answers when you complete the task!**

Victorians: Read through the pdf slides to find out what the Industrial Revolution was and how it affected Britain. Afterwards, complete one of the differentiated tasks. The first activity is the easiest in terms of complexity and then each subsequent task increases in the level of difficulty. Please choose the task you're most comfortable with.

- 2A - Look at the statements about the Industrial Revolution. Cut them out and organise the statements into three piles - positive effects, negative effects or both. When you're happy with it, stick them on a piece of paper under the respective three headings.
- 2B - Write a list of the positive and negative effects of the Industrial Revolution on worksheet 2B.
- 2C – Read the Challenge Card provided and follow the steps to write an overview of the effects of the Industrial Revolution on Britain. You will need to write a paragraph for each section.

Extension: Cut out the Key Word Card and then pick a card out of the set. The key word you pick will be the word you will use as the basis for a page in a class information book on the Industrial Revolution. For example, if you pick the 'Spinning Jenny' card you will need to research the Spinning Jenny to find out what it is then create a page with a description of what it is, how it was used and pictures or diagrams.

- For names, such as Henry Bessemer, you could write a short biography and a description of their contribution to the Industrial Revolution.
- Take a bit of time to research your Key Word using books, the internet, etc., then create your page. You can do more than one key word if you want.

What do you think was the most important development of the Industrial Revolution? Is it possible to say that one thing was more important than another or are all the events linked by cause and effect?

Extension: Explain what the workbook has helped you learn when you complete it.

- 3 Maths: For the next few weeks, we'll be learning about a special kind of maths called Geometry. For the sixth and final concept we'll be looking at will be quadrilaterals. Extension: I thought we should take this opportunity to revise the work we've done on perimeters.

Art.: Read through the pdf slides to explore the artwork of William Morris and the arts and crafts movement. Afterwards, complete one of the differentiated tasks. The first activity is the easiest in terms of complexity and then each subsequent task increases in the level of difficulty. Please choose the task you're most comfortable with.

- Choose the pattern you like most from the Blank Wallpaper sheets and colour it in using colours that William Morris would have used. Encourage Look really carefully at the pattern and colour in with care and attention to detail.
- Look through the Picture Cards carefully, then design and colour a wallpaper pattern based on the designs of William Morris on plain paper.
- Look through the Picture Cards carefully, and then design a wallpaper pattern based on the designs of William Morris. When you have designed your wallpaper in pencil, photocopy the design several times so that you can experiment with different colour schemes for your design.

If you have your Purple Mash password and you're looking for something different, then try this activity by clicking on 2paint.

- Look through the Picture Cards and use a computer software package (such as 2Paint – Purple Mash) to design a wallpaper pattern based on the designs of William Morris. You could use the fill colours tool, and change the size of the brushstrokes, etc. When it is finished, you could print off the designs. For an original display, print the designs off onto acetate (OHP paper) and stick onto your windows. (Please ask permission from your adult).
